Objects of the charity: The objectives of the society are stated in the constitution. These

are 1) to educate the public in the art and science of music in all its aspects by the presentation of concerts and other activities and 2) such other charitable purposes as the committee may from time to

time decide.

Powers of the trustees: The powers of the trustees are defined as follows:

a raising funds, selling tickets for concerts and inviting contributions, provided that in raising funds the committee shall not undertake any substantial permanent trading

activities and shall conform to any relevant requirements of

the law.

- b buying, taking on lease or in exchange any property necessary for the achievement of the objectives, and maintaining it and equipping it for use.
- c borrowing money and charging all or part of the property of the society with repayment of the money so borrowed, subject to any consents required by law.
- d hiring and paying professional musicians and employing such staff (who are not members of the society) as are necessary for the proper pursuit of the objectives.
- e co-operating with other charities, voluntary bodies and statutory authorities operating in furtherance of the objectives or of similar charitable purposes, and exchanging information and advice with them.
- f establishing or supporting any charitable trusts, associations or institutions formed for all or any of the objectives.
- g appointing and constituting such advisory committees as the management committee shall think fit.
- h doing all such other lawful things as are necessary for the achievement of the objectives.

Main activities undertaken:

The formal objectives of the Henley Symphony Orchestra have been described above. The orchestra aims to bring live music to the local community and to provide musical education to its members.

The orchestra rehearses weekly at Henley College with a professional Musical Director.

Concert venues include Christ Church in Henley-on-Thames and the Concert Hall and the Hexagon in Reading. At least four concerts are given annually.

The orchestra gives concerts, by invitation, in Henley's twin towns of Leichlingen, Germany, and Falaise, France

2019-20 is the twenty-fifth year under the musical direction of **Ian Brown.** We are able to attract soloists of international reputation, and this year were delighted to welcome **Adrian Brendel: Cello** to perform Dvořák's C*ello Concerto* at the Reading Concert Hall, Reading in November, and **Kristian Bezuidenhout: Piano** to perform *Piano Concerto No 20 K466* by Mozart at the Hexagon, Reading, in March. We had originally invited **Eric Lu** to perform this concerto with us at the Hexagon, but he was forced to withdraw because of the suddenly imposed travel restrictions to the USA caused by the international outbreak of Coronavirus – COVID 19. Kristian Bezuidenhout came in at short notice to stand in for Eric Lu, and the orchestra responded enthusiastically to his light and refined musical approach.

Our Hexagon concert took place just a few days before the nationally imposed "lockdown" in response to COVID 19. We were fortunate to be able to perform that evening, but many of our audience – perhaps a third - stayed away because of fears of the spreading infection. Sadly, the remaining two concerts of our 2019 -2020 programme, at the Christ Church Centre and Henley Festival, together with our Open Evening for our Friends and Business Friends, had to be cancelled. Although some members of the orchestra were able to return to rehearsing for a few weeks, a further national lockdown has sadly brought this to an end.

The orchestra continues to develop and to gain valuable knowledge and ability through lan's guidance and encouragement, and to expand its repertoire and tackle more demanding works. The standard of the playing of the orchestra continues at a high level. The orchestra has travelled several times to the twin towns of Henley in France and Germany, and Slovenia. The orchestra hopes to be able to return to rehearsing and performing in 2021.

Financial Review

Reserves policy: To maintain reserves equivalent to one year's running costs.

Further financial details: The accounts of the society for the financial year 2019 / 2020 are

appended to this report.

The assets owned by the society include a full set of timpani and other requirements such as lighting. There is no major expenditure required

for further, or replacement equipment, in the near future.

Treasurer's Report

Financially, 2019-20 has been a significant improvement from the previous year for the orchestra. This was due to careful management of costs and two significant initiatives to boost income: the relaunch of the Friends Scheme which has attracted many generous donations from new and loyal Friends of the orchestra, and participation in the Orchestra Tax Relief scheme, which has enabled the orchestra to benefit from a tax rebate after the end of the financial year.

A significant amount of administrative and accounting changes have been needed to implement the Orchestra Tax Relief scheme. Henley Symphony Orchestra Productions Ltd, registered company number 11957773, was set up in 2019 with two members of the orchestra committee (trustees) as directors of the company. All of the orchestra's concert expenditure now goes through this company, paid for by a 'commissioning fee' from the orchestra, while concert income is retained by the orchestra. This allows the company to claim a rebate of corporation tax on the loss it makes, which is then returned to the orchestra. The tax reclaimed for the 2019-20 season of concerts was £6219, which is very welcome income for the orchestra. The change has meant that the accounts need to be presented in a different way from previous years.

In cash terms, the orchestra has made a deficit of £4464 during 2019-20. Much of this was due to late expenditure from the previous financial year relating to the Hexagon concert in 2019. However, taking into account the loan outstanding to the production company, the assets of the orchestra at the end of the year increased by just over £3000 to £34,945. This is significantly down from a few years ago, following decisions to spend reserves and the loss of a key sponsor in 2018, but it represents a good level of reserves and allows the orchestra to plan less conservatively in these uncertain times.

The previous year's accounts were prepared on a receipts and payments basis, so figures are not all directly comparable.
