Objects of the charity

The objectives of the society, as stated in the constitution, are 1) to educate the public in the art and science of music in all its aspects by the presentation of concerts and other activities and 2) such other charitable purposes as the committee may from time to time decide.

Powers of the trustees

The powers of the trustees (the Committee) are defined as follows:

- a) raising funds, selling tickets for concerts and inviting contributions, provided that in raising funds the Committee shall not undertake any substantial permanent trading activities and shall conform to any relevant requirements of the law
- b) buying, taking on lease or in exchange any property necessary for the achievement of the objectives, and maintaining it and equipping it for use
- c) borrowing money and charging all or part of the property of the Society with repayment of the money so borrowed, subject to any consents required by law
- d) hiring and paying professional musicians and employing such staff (who are not members of the Society) as are necessary for the proper pursuit of the objectives
- e) co-operating with other charities, voluntary bodies and statutory authorities operating in furtherance of the objectives or of similar charitable purposes, and exchanging information and advice with them
- f) establishing or supporting any charitable trusts, associations or institutions formed for all or any of the objectives
- g) appointing and constituting such advisory committees as the Committee shall think fit
- h) cooperating with and supporting Henley Symphony Orchestra Productions Limited (company number 11957773) (the "Production Company") in furtherance of all or any of the objectives and in particular but without limiting the generality of the foregoing to enter into agreements with the Production Company for it to produce a concert or series of concerts and to pay the production costs in return for a commission fee payable by the Society
- i) provide loans or other financial assistance to the Production Company (whether interest-free or otherwise and whether by instalments or otherwise) if and when required to enable the Production Company to pay production and other expenses under such agreements
- doing all such other lawful things as are necessary for the achievement of the objectives.

Main activities undertaken

The orchestra aims to bring live music to the local community and to provide musical education to its members. The orchestra rehearses weekly at Henley College with a professional Musical Director and leader. Concert venues include Christ Church in Henley-on-Thames and the Hexagon in Reading. At least four concerts are given annually. The orchestra gives concerts, by invitation, in Henley's twin towns of Leichlingen (Germany), Falaise (France) and Bled (Slovenia).

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

This report covers the 2021-22 concert season, from September 2021 to July 2022.

In the year 2021 –22 the orchestra gave:

- Six public concerts in the UK (although two were cancelled at short notice), and
- One Open Evening for HSO Friends and Business Friends.

2021-22 was the twenty-seventh year under the musical direction of **lan Brown**, but it has also been his last, as he announced his retirement in April 2022. So these concerts listed above were the last in which **lan Brown** conducted the Henley Symphony Orchestra.

It was with great joy that we were able to return to a full orchestra programme in September, 2021 at the beginning of the 2021-22 season after the restrictions and cancellations caused by COVID. We are able to attract soloists of a high calibre and in November 2021 welcomed **Matilda Lloyd**, a fast-rising artist to play Haydn's *Trumpet Concerto* at the Reading Concert Hall. Sadly, our concerts in December 2021 were cancelled at short notice due to increasing COVID cases locally. In March, 2022, the baritone **Dominic Segwick** joined us to sing Mahler's *Songs of a Wayfarer*, before joining 3 young professionals **Eline Vandenheede** Soprano, **Leila Zanette** Mezzo Soprano, **Glen Cunningham** Tenor and combined choirs from **Henley Choral Society**, **Reading Bach Choir** and the **Glass Ensemble** in Beethoven's *Symphony No 9 in D Minor "Choral"* at the Hexagon in Reading.

The orchestra has continued to develop and to gain valuable knowledge and ability through lan's guidance and encouragement, and to expand its repertoire and tackle more demanding works. The standard of the playing of the orchestra continues at a high level. The orchestra has travelled several times to Henley's twin towns in France and Germany, and once to Slovenia.

The orchestra advertised for a Principal Conductor and Music Director in May 2022, for which it received 21 complete applications. A selection panel of the Committee interviewed 9 candidates in July, selecting 6 of them to audition when it returned to rehearsing in September 2022. **Leon Bosch** was overwhelmingly selected by members of HSO as their preferred candidate, and takes up his role with HSO in January, 2023.

Financial Review

Reserves policy: To maintain reserves equivalent to one year's running costs.

Further financial details: The accounts of the society for the financial year 2021 / 2022 are

appended to this report.

The assets owned by the society include a full set of timpani and other requirements such as lighting. There is no major expenditure required

for further, or replacement equipment, in the near future.

Treasurer's Report

The orchestra returned to playing in person this year following a year of cancelled concerts, but lower numbers of both players and audience members meant that this has been a challenging year financially. Ticket income during the year was very much lower than normal, but costs have been increasing due to high levels of inflation and in particular fuel costs. The orchestra remains very grateful to members and friends for their generous support.

Henley Symphony Orchestra Productions Ltd (HSOP), registered company number 11957773, was set up in 2019 with two members of the orchestra committee (trustees) as directors of the company, to take advance of HMRC's Orchestra Tax Relief scheme. The orchestra pays an annual commissioning fee to this subsidiary company covering the costs of putting on concerts, while concert income is retained by the orchestra. This allows the company to claim a rebate of corporation tax on the loss it makes, which is then returned to the orchestra. The rate of tax relief has been temporarily increased from 25% to 50% from autumn 2021 until March 2023 to support recovery of the arts post-pandemic, and this provided a welcome boost to our income, with a tax credit of over £9000 for this year.

The orchestra was also pleased to receive grants totalling £1550 from Henley Town Council - £750 carried over from 2020 and an additional £800 awarded in 2022 - to provide free concert tickets to local children.

Despite this, overall the orchestra made a loss of £5901 over the year due to much reduced income for the reasons already given. Some ticket income was paid directly to the production company due to the accounting arrangements with Reading Arts, and this, together with the lower income overall, meant that again the orchestra's income was under £25,000, so no independent examination of the accounts was required.

1. Ticket sales

This figure does not include ticket sales of £2688.53 paid to HSOP from the Hexagon concert in March 2022. Total ticket sales including this amount were £11664.

2. Other sales

This figure includes card sales and payment from choirs for vocal score hire.

3. Other revenue

Refund of venue deposit paid from money collected from orchestra members for the postponed orchestra party.

4. HSOP Commissioning Fee

Total costs of production: £41479, broken down as: commissioning fee £29754, other income £2689 (see note 1), OTR £9036.

5. Income and Expenditure as Agent

These accounts do not include income and expenditure where the charity acted as an agent only. In March 2022, the orchestra collected the sum of £1488.70 at its Hexagon Concert and this amount was paid directly to the DEC Ukraine Appeal.
