HSO, in its 54th season, returns to the Hexagon for its annual spring concert. From the first concert held in a borrowed marquee in Shiplake, HSO has gone from strength to strength, attracting some 50 players from across the Thames Valley and promoting an annual series of four concerts. HSO is delighted to welcome **Alexander Walker** as Guest Conductor and **Rebecca Afonwy-Jones**, mezzo-soprano, as soloist.

Rebecca Afonwy-Jones mezzo-soprano

Rebecca Afonwy-Jones began her career as a Scottish Opera Emerging Artist, subsequently joining Welsh National Opera as an Associate Artist. Regular concert engagements have included her BBC Proms debut singing Vaughan Williams' *Serenade to Music* with BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra.

This season, she joins If Opera Company to sing roles including Marthe *Iolanta;* joins Mid Wales Opera as Dama Macbeth and Longborough Festival Opera as Wellgunde Das Rheingold / Götterdämmerung and Waltraute Die Walküre; and sings Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 at London's Barbican Hall.



The sparkling mood of the opening *Academic Festival Overture*, with its potpourri of boisterous student drinking songs, was written by **Brahms** as a thank you to Breslau University after he was awarded an honorary doctorate.

Schumann predicted that **Brahms** would be the musical successor to Beethoven, and his *Second Symphony* surely fulfils this promise, with its rich depth of orchestral splendour. Written whilst on holiday in Austria in 1877, it is often described as the most melodious and sunny of **Brahms's** four symphonies, but he himself wrote 'Black wings are constantly beating above us'.

Sea Pictures, written by Elgar in 1899 immediately after the Enigma Variations, share Enigma's mastery of orchestral tone-painting in five contrasting songs. The composition was encouraged by his wife, Alice, who wrote the second song. Janet Baker's 1965 recording of *Sea Pictures* with John Barbirolli remains a benchmark account.
